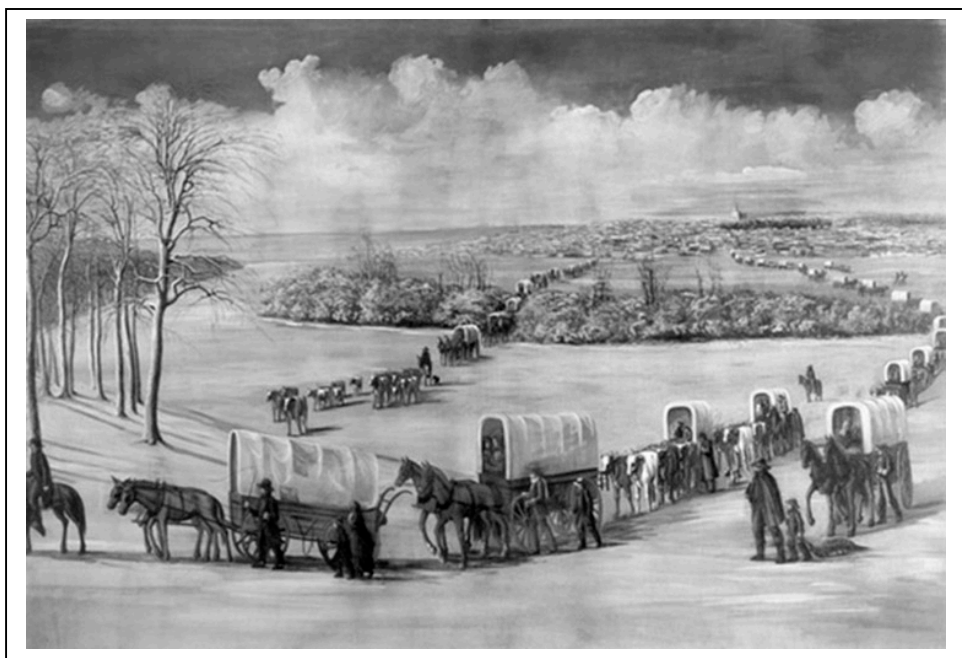


# The Annals of Iowa
