GREGORY GROHMAN argues that since 1994 the Transcendental Meditation movement has conducted a sustained campaign against genetic engineering from its base in Fairfield, Iowa. By examining books, pamphlets, magazine articles, advertisements, and public lectures, he contends that scholars have misconstrued the history of anti-GMO activism by overlooking the particular lifeworld of the TM movement.
