Another volume of *Public Papers of the Presidents*, published by the Office of the Federal Register, is now available— the public messages, speeches, and statements of President Lyndon B. Johnson during 1965. This volume, consisting of two books, contains special messages to Congress; the televised remarks announcing the arrest of members of the Ku Klux Klan (March 26, 1965); a message to the Congress requesting additional appropriations for military needs in Viet-Nam (May 4, 1965); a statement by the President following passage by the Senate of the Voting Rights Bill (May 26, 1965); remarks to the members of the Iowa Trade Mission (June 9, 1965); a statement by the President following a meeting on the Dominican Situation (June 16, 1965); the full text of news conferences; letters from the President; and many other items of significance.

The Public Papers of the Presidents give great insight into the issues and policies of our government and the personalities of our Presidents.
