## SOME PUBLICATIONS

The Trans-Mississippi West: A Guide to Its Periodical Literature (1811-1938). By Oscar Osburn Winther. Bloomington, Indiana: Indiana University. 1942. Pp. 263. This useful guide is issued as number three in the Social Science Series of the Indiana University Publications. The material is arranged by topics in a single alphabet under headings which include States, Territories, regions, and subjects, such as Alaska, British Columbia, Buffalo, California, California Gold Rush, Canada, Cattle, Indians, Transportation and Communication, etc. Geographic divisions constiute approximately one-half of the sixty-seven topics. No two compilers would agree on the topics to be included in such a reference guide, but for the middle west and northwest one might expect to find Agriculture and Lumbering included as topics. Location of topics sought would have been made easier if the topics had been indicated on the folio lines. A table of contents in the front and an index of authors at the back add to the value of the work. Iowa and Iowa writers are well represented in the guide. Of the 3501 references cited 367 are listed under Iowa, and other topics also have items by Iowa authors.

Franquelin, Mapmaker, by Jean Delanglez, is one of the articles in Mid-America for January.

Number five of the first volume of Bulletins of the American Association for State and Local History contains A Publicity Program for the Local Historical Society, by J. Martin Stroup.

The fifth number in the Agricultural History Series is A History of Livestock Raising in the United States, 1607-1860, by James Westfall Thompson. This series is published by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Fairport Harbor Village Site, by Richard G. Morgan and H. Holmes Ellis; The Order of the Purple Heart, by Mary Mc-Mullin Jones; and Columbus: Ohio's Capital, by Elmer E. Noyes, are the three articles in The Ohio State Archaeological and Historical Quarterly for January-March.

Iowa Bird Life for March contains a biographical sketch of T. C. Stephens, one of Iowa's ornithologists, by Mrs. H. J. Taylor.

Military and Naval Masonic Activity, by C. C. Hunt, appears in the January and February numbers of the Bulletin of the Grand Lodge of Iowa, A. F. & A. M.

A genealogical contribution of interest in Iowa because it includes some Iowans is Musser and Allied Families, by J. C. Fox, in the January number of Americana.

A collection of historical articles, written by Harvey Ingham for the *Des Moines Register*, have been reprinted and collected in a small volume bound under the title *Stories of Iowa*.

Iowa's Park Program Had Humble Start, by G. L. Ziemer, and Elephants, Camels Once Roamed Iowa's Acres are two articles of historical interest in the February number of the Iowa Conservationist.
