# SOME PUBLICATIONS

Atlas of American History. James Truslow Adams, editor in chief; LeRoy H. Appleton, chief cartographer. New York: Charles Scribner's Sons. 1943. Pp. 360, maps. This is a collection of 147 maps prepared for the purpose of assisting history students to locate the areas and places where events happened. The usefulness of this collection is greatly enhanced by the complete and detailed index. The maps are not crowded with names and the lettering used is easily read. A large number of historians assisted in the preparation and verification of these maps and the Atlas is a valuable supplement to the Dictionary of American History.

Is American History on the Way Out?, by Philip D. Jordan, is one of the articles in The Chronicles of Oklahoma for March.

The Production of Local History Plays and Pageants, by Samuel Selden, has been published as number six of Volume I of Bulletins of the American Association for State and Local History.

Herman H. Fussler, Head of the Department of Photographic Reproduction, University of Chicago Libraries, is the author of *Photographic Reproduction for Libraries*, published by the University of Chicago Press.

The April number of the Indiana History Bulletin contains a discussion entitled War History Work, including "State Work", "County Collections", "Organizing a County War History Committee", and "What to Collect".

Volume X in The Territorial Papers of the United States, compiled and edited by Clarence Edwin Carter, has been recently published. This volume includes papers relating to the Territory of Michigan for the years 1805–1820.

The Filson Club History Quarterly for April is devoted to two

articles on Joshua Fry Speed. The first of these is Joshua Fry Speed, 1814-1882, by Robert L. Kincaid. The second part contains Lincoln's Letters to Speed.

The April number of *The American-German Review* contains an article on Mennonites in Iowa in 1874, reprinted from the *Mount Pleasant Free Press* of May 28, 1874. This article was first reprinted in the *Mennonite Historical Bulletin* for December, 1942.

Williamson, edited by Henry Lee Swint, are articles and papers in the Wisconsin Magazine of History for March.
