From the President

ILA/ACRL's Executive Board has been hard at work, planning an exceptional year of activities for Chapter members. I'll touch on a few of those activities in my message this time.

First, I'm happy to announce that the Chapter's listserv, IA-ACRL, is up and running. A brief summary of what we envision for this list, as well as instructions for joining the listserv, are found elsewhere in this issue. We expect traffic to be fairly light on this list, so you needn't feel it will flood your mailbox. Help us spread the word about IA-ACRL by sending the address to individuals or by posting it on appropriate listservs. E-mail me (mary-mcinroy@uiowa.edu) if you would like an electronic copy of the announcement and instructions to send out. If you do send the announcement out, please copy me so I can avoid excess duplication in posting.

Second, and this is a result of the first activity I mentioned, the Executive Board has made a change in the distribution policy for the paper version of the Newsletter. We intend to post an electronic copy of the Newsletter on the IA-ACRL list, beginning with this issue. Last fall we found that the cost for printing and mailing three issues of the paper newsletter to all persons listed in the Directory had exceeded \$1000. The Board, after considerable debate, took the difficult decision to limit mailing of the paper version only to members of the Chapter. Please note, therefore, that this will be the last issue of the Newsletter that will be distributed to non-Chapter members in paper format. We remind those who have an ongoing interest in ILA/ACRL activities, but who haven't yet joined the Chapter, that joining is as simple as checking the box on your ILA renewal form. If you need a form, please see the renewal reminder below for address information. At present, there is no charge for adding ILA/ACRL affiliation. Taking measures to reduce costs will help keep this so.

Third, I want to bring you up to date on our possible joint 1998 spring conference with Nebraska. Our conference pre-planning session was held on February 25. Vice President / President-Elect Mary Beveridge, Executive Board members Bob Rose and Daria Bossman, and I met at Drake with a group from Nebraska to discuss such issues as length of conference, division of tasks and any profits, and the possibility of obtaining funding from the national ACRL for 1998 conference programming. I expect we will have more news to share with you at the business meeting in April.

This brings me to the Spring Conference, which will be held on April 25 in Iowa City at the Iowa Memorial Union. First, I would like to note the appointment of a new member, Ellen Neuhaus (UNI) to the Spring Program Committee. A summary of Conference plans may be found below. Please use the enclosed form to register for a very full day of activities. See you there.

Finally, those of you who mark their calendars early should record that the 1997 ILA Fall Meeting will be held in Sioux City, October 8-10. See you there, too.

Choose It or Lose It: Controlling Our Future. ILA/ACRL Spring Conference, University of Iowa, Iowa City, April 25, 1997

The 1997 ILA/ACRL Spring Conference, "Choose it or Lose it: Controlling Our Future," will be held at the Iowa Memorial Union at the University of Iowa on Friday, April 25th. Registration for the Conference will be from 8:00 a.m. - 9:00 a.m. and the program will run from 9:00 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.

The keynote speaker will be William Miller, ACRL President and Director of Libraries at Florida Atlantic University. His topic will be "Gearing Up While Looking Backward." He will also be a member of a morning panel that will discuss publishing and library purchasing.

Afternoon sessions will offer contributed papers discussing distance learning from a community college perspective, design of a for-credit information retrieval course for undergraduate students, and a session on "New Age OPACs: Prototypes and Possibilities." A guest speaker from the Iowa State Library will discuss the SILO Project. The afternoon will also offer participants the chance to hear a panel of Iowa librarians discuss the recent national ACRL conference in Nashville. Finally, two opportunities will be offered for tours of the new Information Commons at the University of Iowa's Hardin Library for Health Sciences.

ACRL Chapters Council at 1997 ALA Mid-Winter

Mary Beveridge and I attended the mid-winter Chapters Council meeting in Washington, D.C. last month. Much emphasis was given during the meeting to one of the main initiatives in the ACRL Strategic Plan: increasing governmental and legislative awareness and activities by academic librarians. Our chapter already has appointed its governmental representative (Dottie Persson, University of Iowa), and she will pass on to the membership, via postings on the IA-ACRL listsery, any legislative news or items requiring action on our part.

Discussion also focused on the need of many academic librarians for training in effective lobbying of representatives and senators on both national and local levels.

Much of the tension from last summer's Chapters Council meeting has subsided, but there is still a strong interest, on the part of a core group of people, in working toward more productive relations between the Chapters Council and ACRL; and at the very least in improving communication among the chapters themselves. Questions about the national group may be directed to ACRL President Bill Miller, keynote speaker during the Spring Conference in Iowa City on April 25.

African-American Women in Iowa Project

Launched in August, 1995, the African-American Women in Iowa project is now well underway at the Iowa Women's Archives in the University of Iowa Libraries. This initiative, directed by Kathryn M. Neal, is intended to document the lives of African-American women in the state. By collecting the personal papers and organizational records of African-American women, the Archives will help document the experiences of a group largely ignored in earlier histories of Iowa.

So far, more than two dozen collections have been donated from women in such occupational fields as education, social work, the performing arts, and domestic work. Among the materials are the papers of Mason City native Esther J. Walls.

A graduate of the University of Iowa, Walls was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in 1948. Denied a teaching position, she found a job in the Mason City public library which sparked her passion for librarianship. Walls earned a master's degree in library science from Columbia University and went on to build an extensive career as a library administrator. At the time of her retirement in 1988, she was Associate Director of Libraries at the State University of New York (SUNY) / Stony Brook. Walls's papers, which include photographs, scrapbooks, correspondence, and publications, primarily document her college years and professional life.

An advisory board assists in developing the project's collections. Future endeavors will include conducting oral history interviews with selected women as well as continuing to extend the range of the archives.
