Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant

Holiday decorating took on new meaning at Chadwick Library this year when four library student employees built an 8-foot Christmas tree from over 750 books.

Utilizing blue and green non-circulating books, students spent a recent Sunday evening creating and decorating this unique tree, which is located in the Chadwick Library Café. The colors of the books were selected to convey an artistic interpretation of a blue spruce tree. The tree will be on display until January 11. Another book sculpture created by library student employee, entitled "Old Glory" is also on display and depicts the American flag constructed of red and blue non-circulating books. The field of blue features books of related to American history. Both the tree and the flag are part of a new exhibit entitled, "Images of Art: Books as Art, Art as Books," which is currently under construction. "Images of Art" will be on display through spring semester and includes a variety of mediums explaining the intricate relationship of books and art. The exhibit is located on the main level of Chadwick Library and is available during regular library hours.

Digital Grinnell

In collaboration with several other campus units, the Grinnell College Libraries have launched the [Digital Grinnell repository](#) for making selected scholarly and creative work of Grinnell faculty, students, and staff accessible, searchable, and visible to the world. Most materials in Digital Grinnell will be available world-wide and will be indexed by Google and Google Scholar. Selected materials that document college history will also be part of Digital Grinnell. Digital Grinnell currently has three components within one system:

- A general repository for student projects; published articles written by Grinnell faculty, students, or staff (with proper copyright authorization); video or audio files; and other materials. Each item is fully cataloged with abstract, authors, advisors, and subject terms. The repository allows searching and browsing. Materials in Digital Grinnell can be showcased through the college or departmental websites.
- A journal publication platform: Digital Grinnell can host peer-reviewed or editor-reviewed journals and can help manage submission, review, and publication of journal issues.
- A conference paper platform: For an academic conference, Digital Grinnell can help manage submission, review, and publication of the conference papers.

Digital Grinnell is built on three open-source software packages: [Islandora](#), the general repository; [Open Journal Systems](#), the journal publication platform; and [Open Conference Systems](#), the conference paper platform. We have a support contract with a firm called Discovery Garden, Inc., for all three systems.

Digital Grinnell is a collaborative project of the Libraries, Curricular Technology, Faulconer Gallery, the Dean's Office, Information Technology Services, Communications, and the Office of the President.

Community College Library News

Northeast Iowa Community College—Peosta
First Anniversary



The library is celebrating its first year in its new facility. We have also partnered with the Dubuque County Library and are acting as their Peosta branch, which allows us to serve the community in a broader capacity. Humanities Iowa Grant

The Peosta Campus Library and Dubuque County Library have jointly received a grant from

Humanities Iowa that supports a Literature into Films program. Its purpose is to demonstrate how books and movies can tell the same story in a different way. The books include *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?* (the movie is *Blade Runner*), *The Great Gatsby*, *True Grit*, and *Seabiscuit*.



Hawkeye Community College, Waterloo

iPad circulations have been brisk at the Hawkeye Library. The library has 10 iPad 3s that students may check out for one week. Purchasing Apple Care+ for the devices has paid off, as the library has just replaced its first broken iPad. With Apple Care+, the repair cost was limited to \$49, which was passed along to the student.

In addition, the library has added six new desktop computers for student use, repurposing a space that was previously devoted to video stacks. The Hawkeye Library now offers students 36 desktop computers, 12 wireless laptops for library use only, and 20 laptops that check out for one week.

The Hawkeye Library will be launching a streaming portal for Media Education Foundation films in January. If others have not seen this new streaming service, please check it out. Candace Havelly, Library Director, is quite impressed and feels that it is easy and flexible to use.

Van Allen Data Tapes

The UI Libraries has been awarded \$200,000 from the Carver Trust to digitize the data tapes from the Explorer I satellite mission that led to the discovery of the Van Allen radiation belts. These tapes were recovered from the basement of Maclean Hall through the outstanding efforts of our Preservation Department in 2010-2011.

Arthur Benton Award

Jennifer DeBerg is recipient of the Arthur Benton Excellence in Reference Services Professional Development Award. This award is given biennially to a University Libraries' professional staff member who has demonstrated outstanding commitment in providing reference service for the university community. The honor includes a \$1,000 stipend to be used for professional development activities related to the advancement of reference services.

Gallup Papers

The complete work of one of the University of Iowa's famous alumni has found its home in the University of Iowa Special Collections and University Archives. The papers of the late George Gallup Sr. (1923 BA, 1925 MA, 1928 PhD), founder of the Gallup Poll, now live within UI Special Collections after being generously donated by the Gallup family.

"This gift from the Gallup family is an incredible resource for the university, and one that will be eagerly sought after by researchers and scholars," says Greg Prickman, head of UI Special Collections and University Archives. "The development of polling in the United States is a story with great historical significance, and these papers will open up that history for the first time." More on this story at [Iowa Now](#).
