an editor. With Stephen Corey, he compiled and edited *Spreading the Word: Editors on Poetry* (Bench Press).


JAY SNODGRASS is the author of *Monster Zero*, poems about Godzilla. "Island Psalm" is from his new book, *The Underflower*.
