#### Quad City Area Archeological Society Activities

McGregor, Ia., Effigy Mounds National Monument Superintendent M. E. Thompson announced that Edgar W. Dodd has joined the staff at the Monument. He will occupy the position formerly held by Gary Matlock who transferred to Pecos Nat'l Monument near Santa Fe. NM.

Stanley L. Klein of DeWitt, Iowa was the victim of an automobile accident south of Dubuque on August 7, 1970. He was in a Dubuque hospital for two weeks, then transferred to Veterans' Hospital in Iowa City where he passed away September 8. He is survived by his wife, Marie Andersen Klein, and a son and daughter all at home.

Stan was born in New York City April 13, 1921, was reared in Pennsylvania and graduated from Iowa State University. He served with the 82nd Airborne Division during World War II in North African, Sicilian and Italian campaigns. Following the war he farmed and taught Veterans' Onfarm Training in Pottawattamie County, then farmed in Clark County and later joined the U.S. Scil Conservation Service where he served in Jasper, Tama and the duo counties, Scott and Clinton, as District Soil Conservationist. Stan was an ardent conservationist and was in the process of setting up watersheds in both Scott and Clinton Counties at the time of the accident.

He was Vice President of the Iowa Archeological Society during the years 1967-68 and 1968-69 and a Trustee in the year 1965-66. He was a charter member of the Quad-Cities Archeological Society. Stan enjoyed the collecting of artifacts as a hobby, seldom returning from a day's work on the land without a few arrowheads or scrapers in his pocket.



The Stanley Klein Memorial Fund has been established by a sizeable contribution from his family to the IOWA ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY. Perhaps other members of the Society who worked with and knew Stan and appreciated how much he did for the I A S would like to contribute to this fund.

Stanley was a longtime member of the Iowa Society, and after his job transfer from Toledo to De Witt, was unable to devote as much time to the Society as he would have liked to do.

The I A S officers and members extend their deepest sympathy to Mrs. Klein and family and also send their thanks for the fine gesture made on behalf of their loved one.

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#### Activities of the CENTRAL ICNA CHAPTER, I A S. David Carlson, Otho

For its winter series the Chapter meets on the second Monday evening of each month in the library Building of the Iowa Central Community College at 7:00 pm. These meetings will continus through May when the Chapter will return to its field project.

The salvage operation at 13 H N 51, the Bergman site north of Stratford, Iowa continued at a satisfactory rate. There was a good turnout of volunteer workers throughout the summer and a large amount of diagnostic material was recovered. One interesting feature consisted of a group burial of at least fuve individual bundles placed on and around a flexed burial. This particualr mass burial also contained an intact Woodland pottery vessel of the so called "Havana" type.

At the present time the group is getting the written material, field notes, sketches and phetographs assembled for a tenative report on the site to date. The lab work on all of the recovered material will commence after Jan. 1st and volunteers are to help wash and sort bones and artifacts.

From the amount of material uncovered so far and from the remaining area to be excavated, it appears that this project may be completed by the end of the summer of 1971. A detailed report will be given in the entire operation at a later date.
