

COTTONWOOD COUNTY PETROGLYPHS

WE WERE BREEZING DOWN THE HIGHWAY IN OUR FLAME RED OPEL (NOW DECEASED) HEADING FOR NORTHERN MINNESOTA WHEN MY WIFE CHECKED THE ROAD MAP AND FOUND WE WERE HEADED EAST. I TRIED TO COVER UP BY SAYING I KNEW A SHORT CUT, BUT THE FACT WAS I HAD MISSED A TURN AND WE WERE NOW 20 MILES: FROM HIGHWAY 71, OUR INTENDED ROUTE. RATHER THAN DOUBLE BACK, 1 DEMONSTRATED AN ACT OF FAITH AND HEADED NORTH ON THE FIRST HARD SURFACE ROAD. FORTUNE SMILED AND WE FOUND OURSELVES ON HIGHWAY 30 WHICH LED US BACK TO 71. STREAKING DOWN THE HIGHWAY (NOTE HOW YOU ALWAYS DRIVE FASTER AFTER YOU HAVE TAKEN A WRONG ROAD), I GLIMPSED A SIGN WHICH READ "INDIAN PETROGLYPHS." Since IT was November and the sign INDICATED THE EXHIBIT WAS OPEN FROM MAY TO OCTOBER, WE CONTINUED OUR JOURNEY WITH A MENTAL NOTE TO INVESTIGATE FURTHER. LAST SUMMER WE HAD THE OPPORTUNITY TO FOLLOW THE INDIAN PETROGLYPH SIGNS. FRANKLY WE EXPECTED A TOURIST PLUNDER SHOP WITH A COUPLE OF ROCK DRAWINGS ATTACHED. WE RECEIVED A PLEASANT SURPRISE. SITUATED IN THE MIDDLE OF A FIELD OF NATIVE PRAIRIE PLANTS WAS A QUARTER MILE OUT-CROPPING OF RED QUARTZITE ROCK WHICH CONTAINED APPROXIMATELY PETROGLYPHS. (PETROGLYPH-GREEK WORDS-PETRA MEANS ROCK, GLYPHE MEANS CARVING) THE SITE HAS BEEN CAREFULLY PRESERVED BY THE MINNESOTA HISTORICAL SOCIETY COMPLETE WITH MAP GUIDES AND A MANNED OR TO BE MORE CORRECT A WOMANNED INTERPRETIVE CENTERS


WE WERE FASOINATED BY THE MANY VARIETIES OF ROCK ART WHICH WERE REPRESENTED AT THIS ONE LOCATION. THERE SEEMS TO BE A WIDE RANGE OF SPECULATION CONCERNING THE MEANING AND FUNCTION OF PETROGLYPHS. THE COTTONWOOD COUNTY ROCK CARVINGS COVER MANY SUBJECTS FROM INDENTIFIED ANIMALS TO ABSTRACT DESIGNS. HUMAN FIGURES, SPEARS, TURTLES, ELK, DEER, AND BUFFALO ARE FOUND NEXT TO DRAWINGS WHICH APPEAR TO BE LITTLE MORE THAN DOODLES. SINCE NO GUNS OR HORSES APPEAR ON THE ROCK, ONE CAN ASSUME THAT THE CARVINGS WERE MADE BEFORE THE WHITE MAN REACHED THE AREA IN THE 18TH UNFORTUNATELY, THE SITE HAS BEEN PROTECTED FOR CENTURY. ONLY A FEW YEARS AND MODERN ROCK DRAWINGS IN THE SHAPE OF INITIALS, DATES, ETC. ARE ALSO VISIBLE. THE AREA IS SO REMOTE, HOWEVER, THAT VANDALS HAVE NOT DESTROYED THE SITE AS HAS HAPPENED TO ROCK ART IN OTHER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY . IT WAS ABOUT THE TIME WE DISCOVERED A 19TH CENTURY DATE AND NAME THAT WE FORMED OUR OWN THEORY ABOUT THE DRAWINGS. MAN SEEMS TO HAVE A NATURAL INSTINCT TO LEAVE HIS MARK ON PUBLIC PLACES. SOMEONE STARTED ON THIS ROCK AND OTHERS HAVE FOLLOWED EVER SINCE. COULD THE COTTONWOOD COUNTY PETROGLYPHS BE THE END PRODUCT OF 3000 YEARS OF DOODLING?

AT ANY RATE, THE SITE IS WORTH A VISIT. ALLOW YOURSELF AT LEAST TWO HOURS OR MORE BECAUSE ANYONE WITH AN INTEREST IN ARCHEOLOGY SHOULD BE ENTHRALLED. THE SITE IS OPEN FROM MAY TO OCTOBER FROM 10 A.M. — 6 P.M. DAILY, 1 P.M. — 6 P.M. ON SUNDAYS. WHEN YOU VISIT THE INTERPRETIVE SHELTER, IDENTIFY YOURSELVES AS A MEMBER OF THE I.A.S. TO MRS. FLORENCE


ROEFER, THE PRIME FORCE BEHIND THE PRESERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT OF THE SITE. SHE WILL HAPPILY PROVIDE AS MUCH INFORMATION AS YOU WANT ABOUT PETROGLYPHS. ONE OAN ONLY HOPE THAT THE PRESENT SITE IDENTIFICATION AND PRESERVATION PROJECT IN IOWA WILL LEAD TO AREAS OF BEAUTY AND INTEREST SUCH AS MINNESOTA'S COTTONWOOD COUNTY PETROGLYPHS.

ARCHAEOLOGY IN BEDFORD ENGLAND

ED. NOTE: CHRISTINE DE LISLE IS A STUDENT AT SIMPSON COLLEGE. LAST SUMMER SHE TOOK PART IN AN ARCHEOLOGICAL DIG IN ENGLAND. THE FOLLOWING IS A REPORT OF HER WORK.

Volunteers for the fourth year were trying to rescue the history of Bedford. 45 people which included Americans, French, Canadians, and English worked on the sites set up. The dig was backed by the Department of the Environment and the county council. Bedford Town Council gave equipment and the Bedford Archaeological Society was also involved. The areas being excavated were scheduled for redevelopment. Part of the sites will become part of a parking lot and these areas were given special attention. The sites were centered around the former location of Bedford Castle. The mound there is of great interest to the history of Bedford.


THE SITES WERE THOSE OF THE ANGLO-SAXON AND NORMAN TIME PERIODS. THE SITES NORTH OF THE RIVER OUSE, WERE MORE NORMAN BECAUSE THE EMPHASIS WAS ON BEDFORD CASTLE, A FORTRESS BUILT AFTER THE NORMAN CONQUEST. BUILT IN THE 11TH CENTURY, IT WAS LATER DESTROYED BY HENRY III IN 1224. Under the direction of David Baker, M.A., F.S.A., THE COUNTY COUNCIL'S ARCHAEOLOGICAL OFFICER, WORK WAS DIRECTED TOWARDS TRYING TO FIND ANGLO-SAXON EVIDENCE UNDER THE NORMAN RUINS. ALSO, BECAUSE A DITCH WAS FOUND THE SUMMER BEFORE, THERE WAS SOME INTEREST IN TRYING TO FIND WHERE IT CONNECTED WITH THE CASTLE MOUND. SOUTH OF THE RIVER, WORK WAS CONTINUED FROM THE PREVIOUS SUMMER. OFF St. Marys St., the excavations were that of a complex DOMESTIC SITE DATING TO ANGLO-SAXON TIMES. THE SITES WERE PICKED MOSTLY BECAUSE THEY WERE THE ONES AVAILABLE AT THE TIME. MOST OF THE WORK IN BEDFORD IS RESCUE WORK, AND LAST SUMMERS SITES WERE OPEN WITHIN THE CITY AND AROUND THE CASTLE MOUND.

Work was organized with a head of each trench directing the work everyday. The heads where those students who had been at the dig for a few summers and knew more about what was expected and what the changes in soil texture and color meant. Tools were mostly the shovel, pick, and trowel. The trowel is the important tool in the trenches. It was used on all occasions to check the soil or to clean out or scrape soil from between cobbles and other hard surfaces. The head would check out each new find and then organize the recovery of it. Along with the digging, graph work in the metric system was continuous and organized. Everything was directed by the head of the trench at the beginning of each day.

MOST OF MY WORK WAS DONE ON THE NORTHERN SITES AROUND THE OASTLE MOUND IN GINNS YARD. TRENCH 48 WAS A SLICE 1N THE SIDE OF THE CASTLE MOUND ITSELF. HERE WORK WAS DONE TO CLEAR TOP SOIL QUICKLY AND START LOOKING FOR REMAINS OF THE NORMANS AND ANGLO-SAXONS. PICKING AND SHOVELING WAS THE MAIN ORDER OF WORK WITH TROWELING ENTERING IN TO CHECK SOIL COLOR AND TO INVESTIGATE ANY DIFFERENCES FOUND. THIS TRENCH ENDED UP BEING IMPORTANT BECAUSE LIVTON POTTERY WAS FOUND IN IT. LIVTON POTTERY HAS A GREEN GLAZE TO IT AND WAS NAMED AFTER THE LOCATION WHERE IT WAS MADE. THE POTTERY HAD BEEN PREVIOUSLY DATED TO THE 1250'S, BUT IT WAS FOUND IN THE RUBBLE OF CASTLE RUINS DATING TO THE 1220'S. LATER THAT SUMMER THE FOTTERY WAS REDATED TO AN EARLIER TIME. TRENCH ALSO PRODUCED THE MOAT AND WITHIN IT, A PIECE OF Norman flute, glove, and string. Other sites in the Yard FOUND COBBLE SURFACES AND A GREAT DEAL OF POTTERY. MUCH OF THE FIRST POTTERY WAS 19TH CENTURY WILLOW PATTERN WHICH GAVE WAY TO 17TH CENTURY CLAY PIPE. THE PIPE WAS QUITE LONG WITH A SMALL TUBE AT ONE END FOR THE TOBACCO. THEY WERE USED MANY TIMES UNTIL THE TUBE PART WAS HEATED SHUT AND THEN THROWN AWAY. BONES WERE ALSO FOUND BUT THEY WERE ALL ANIMAL REMAINS. THE NORTHERN SITES WERE PRODUCTIVE IN THE SEARCH FOR EVIDENCE OF NORMAN PRESENCE AROUND THE CASTLE MOUND


MILLCREEK POTTERY FROM A SITE ON THE LITTLE SIOUX RIVER





CHAPTER REPORTS

SOUTHEAST CHAPTER: SUBMITTED BY KEN CUTTS, CHAPTER PRESIDENT

SALISBURY PLAIN, ENGLAND, OLD MEXICO, AND THE STATE OF WASHINGTON HAVE BEEN THE FOCAL POINTS FOR SOME OF THE PROGRAMS AT THE WINTER MEETINGS OF THE SOUTHEAST CHAPTER. PRESIDENT KEN CUTTS GAVE A SLIDE PRESENTATION ON THE MANY MYSTERIES ASSOCIATED WITH STONEHENGE IN SOUTHERN ENGLAND. HAVING COMPLETED A SUMMER OF STUDY IN ENGLAND AND THE CONTINENT, HIS PROGRAM ATTEMPTED TO EXPLAIN SOME OF THE MYSTIQUE ASSOCIATED WITH THE GIANT STONES.

GEORGE HORTON PRESENTED A DUAL PROGRAM AT THE FEBRUARY MEETING WHICH FIRST GAVE THE MEMBERS SOME INSIGHT INTO THE EARLY DAYS OF INDIAN LIFE AT THE RESERVATION NEAR TAMA. HIS SLIDES WERE MADE FROM NEWLY DISCOVERED PICTURES OF THE EARLY INHABITANTS. THE SECOND PART OF HIS PROGRAM, ALSO A SLIDE PRESENTATION, DEALT WITH HIS EXPERIENCES IN MEXICO AND CENTRAL AMERICA IN ARCHAEOLOGICAL RECOVERY WORK.

SEVERAL EXCELLENT FILMS HAVE BEEN SHOWN TO THE GROUP ENTITLED THE LODGE PEOPLE IN IOWA, OLD FORT MADISON, AND ARCHEOLOGY IN WASHINGTON STATE. THESE FILMS HAVE BEEN FURNISHED THROUGH THE COOPERATION WITH THE AREA 15 STATE MEDIA CENTER. THE CLASS OFFERED THIS FALL BY THE CHAPTER HAS BOLSTERED THE RANKS OF THE CHAPTER. CURRENTLY THE CHAPTER IS CONTEMPLATING A PROJECT TO FURTHER INCREASE THIS NEW ENTHUSIASM.

THE PROJECT IS THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL EXPLORATION OF ONE OF THE MOST OUTSTANDING RELIGIOUS AND POLITICAL MAYAN TEMPLE CITIES IN THE YUCATAN PENINSULA OF CENTRAL AMERICA. THE PROGRAM WAS ALSO ILLUSTRATED WITH SLIDES. MR. MCGINN PRESENTLY TEACHES IN THE ANTHROPOLOGY DEPARTMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE, GALESBURG, ILLINOIS.

THE FEBRUARY MEETING WAS A PLANETARIUM PROGRAM ENTITLED "KOPERNIK" BY ROBERT BOLOGNA, PLANETARIUM SPECIALIST AT THE MUSEUM. THE PROGRAM MARKED THE 500TH BIRTHDAY OF THE FAMOUS POLISH ASTRONOMER COPERNICUS WHO CHANGED PHILOSOPHY AND SCIENCE WITH HIS "SUN CENTERED" SOLAR SYSTEM. THE VIEWS OF COPERNICUS WERE THEN DISCUSSED IN THE LIGHT OF MODERN ASTRONOMICAL THEORY. REFRESHMENTS WERE SERVED BY ALINE ONN AND CLIFFORD CHAPMAN.

DEAR "DEAD EYE":

WHEN I WAS JUST A LAD, MY OLE GRANPAPPY USE TO TELL US OF THE STEAMBOAT WHICH SANK AT DESOTA BEND. "DEAD EYE" MCCARTY CHAIRMAN

"ARCHEOLOGY BILL" NOW PENDING BEFORE CONGRESS:

THE 93RD CONGRESS IS CURRENTLY CONSIDERING LEGISLATION WHICH WOULD EXPAND THE PROTECTION OF PREHISTORIC AND HISTORIC SITES IN THE UNITED STATES WHICH WOULD BE DESTROYED OR ALTERED BY THE ACTION OF A FEDERAL AGENCY. ALL PROPOSED CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS MUST INCLUDE A REPORT TO THE SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR CONCERNING THE ARCHEOLOGICAL DATA IN THE AREA. ANY QUALIFIED ORGANIZATION MAY THEN APPLY FOR FUNDS TO SAVE THE THREATENED MATERIAL. THE BILL STIPULATES THAT ARCHEOLOGISTS WILL MAKE THE FINAL DECISION ABOUT THE SALVAGE OPERATIONS FOR ANY CONSTRUCTION SITE.

THE IMPORTANT ASPECT OF THIS LEGISLATION IS THAT ARCHEOLOGISTS WILL HAVE MORE TIME AND FUNDS TO CONDUCT SALVAGE PROJECTS WITH CARE AND COMPETENCE. IN ADDITION, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE POSITIVE STEPS TO SEEK PROFESSIONAL OPINIONS AND TO IDENTIFY THREATENED SITES IN A PROPOSED CONSTRUCTION AREA. THIS LEGISLATION IS AN IMPORTANT STEP FORWARD FOR ARCHEOLOGY IN THE UNITED STATES. CONGRESSMAN WILEY MAYNE OF IOWA IS A CO-SPONSOR OF THE HOUSE VERSION OF THE BILL. THE NUMBER IN THE HOUSE CF REPRESENTATIVES IS H.R. 3584. THE SENATE BILL WAS PASSED LAST YEAR AS \$1245 AND HAS BEEN INTRODUCED AGAIN IN THE 93RD CONGRESS AS 3.514. THE CONGRESS ADJOURNED LAST YEAR BEFORE FINAL APPROVAL OF THE MARCHEOLOGY BILL!! COULD BE OBTAINED.

Members of the lowa Archeology Society should be concerned about the final outcome of this legislation. It is suggested that you express your opinion to the appropriate Congressmen and Senators. THE NAVAJO NATION LOOKS AHEAD BY RALPH LOONEY AND BRUGE DALE PRESENTS A PICTURE OF A CONTEMPORARY INDIAN NATION. MOUNDS: RIDDLES FROM THE INDIAN PAST BY GEORGE E. STUART DEALS WITH A SUBJECT WHICH IS NEAR AND DEAR TO THE HEARTS OF MIDWESTERN ARCHEOLOGISTS. THE SPECIAL PRIZE OF THE DECEMBER ISSUE, HOWEVER, IS THE MAP AND CHART SUPPLEMENT ENTITLED: INDIANS OF NORTH AMERICA.

AT LONG LAST A BOOK ABOUT NORTH AMERICAN ARCHEOLOGY WHICH CAN BE UNDERSTOOD AND ENJOYED BY THE LAYMAN. THE FIRST AMERICAN BY C. W. CERAM PULLS TOGETHER ENGRMOUS AMOUNTS OF RESEARCH AND INFORMATION IN CONCISE AND READABLE FORM. CERAM, WHOSE REAL NAME IS KURT W. MAREK, IS THE AUTHOR OF THE WORLD FAMOUS BOOK, GODS, GRAVES, AND SCHOLARS, WHICH PROVIDED THE LAY READER WITH AN UNDERSTANDABLE ACCOUNT OF ARCHEOLOGY PRIOR TO 1951. THERE CAN BE NO DOUBT THAT SUCH A BOOK WAS NECESSARY. NORTH AMERICAN ARCHEOLOGISTS HAVE BEEN ESPECIALLY PROLIFIC WITH TECHNICAL ARTICLES AND MANUSCRIPTS WHICH ARE SCIENTIFICALLY CORRECT. THE QUESTION REMAINS, HOWEVER, WHETHER THE BOOK PRESENTS AN ACCURATE PICTURE OF THE CURRENT FINDINGS OF ARCHEOLOGISTS. IT WILL BE INTERESTING TO READ PROFESSIONAL REVIEWS OF THE BOOK.
