WHITMAN COLLECTORS' ITEMS

PUBLISHING AWARDS

The Modern Language Association awarded its fifteenth annual Prize for Independent Scholars to Gary Schmidgall for his book Walt Whitman: A Gay Life (Dutton Plume, 1997). Recognizing the "achievements and contributions of independent scholars," the prize carries a stipend of \$1,000. The MLA citation for the award reads in part: "Writing frankly from his own perspective as a gay man, Schmidgall interprets the considerable evidence for the private homosexuality of this great public poet of nineteenth-century America. . . . Throughout this elegantly written book, Schmidgall gives a sympathetic and judicious account of the way Whitman's sexual orientation was part and parcel of his most original and enduring poetry."
