GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS OF STYLE

Essays: Place the title two inches below the top of the page, the author's name two inches below the title, and the text two inches below the author's name. The affiliation of the contributor follows the essay.

Notes, Book Reviews, Bibliographies: These are configured like essays, *except* the author's name follows the work.

References: Follow *The MLA Style Sheet*, Second Edition. Mark references in the text with raised footnote numbers, *not* author-year citations in parentheses. Double-spaced endnotes should follow the essay on a new page headed "Notes."

Do not use Latin abbreviations for repeated citations. Do not condense the names of publishers or titles. Make references complete so a bibliography is unnecessary.

QUOTING AND CITING WALT WHITMAN'S WRITINGS

The standard edition of Whitman's work is *The Collected Writings of Walt Whitman*, twenty-two volumes published by the New York University Press under the general editorship of Gay Wilson Allen and Sculley Bradley. Citations and quotations from Whitman's writings should be keyed to the specific volumes in this edition whenever possible.

After the initial citation, contributors should abbreviate the titles of the *Collected Writings* in the endnotes as follows:



WALT WHITMAN: The Measure of His Song



Edited by Jim Perlman, Ed Folsom and Dan Campion

First published to wide critical acclaim in 1981, this revised and expanded monumental anthology charts the ongoing international response to the legacy of the seminal American poet Walt Whitman (1819-1892). In this series of responses to Whitman rather than scholarly studies of him, we see writers paying tribute to his work, expressing misgivings about it, appealing for aid or guidance, dissenting with one idea, agreeing with another.

The most recent responses

found in the expanded edition of Walt Whitman: The Measure of His Song are by women and minority writers who acknowledge Whitman's liberating affection and egalitarian sensibility. One comes away from these writings with a clear sense that Whitman's vision and artistry matter today and remain of basic use. New contributors include Marge Piercy, Adrienne Rich, Gary Snyder, Sherman Alexie, Rudolfo Anaya, & Garrett Hongo.

Beginning with an engaging introduction by Ed Folsom, "Talking Back to Walt Whitman," this attractively designed book contains nearly 100 contributions, organized in a chronological fashion, interspersed with a portfolio of 18 little-known photographs of Whitman, and capped by an exhaustive bibliography of more than 300 poems and 125 essays of further responses to Whitman.


