PHILADELPHIA CENTENNIAL CONFERENCE: "BREAKING BOUNDS"

"Walt Whitman Breaking Bounds: A Centennial Conference" will be held at the University of Pennsylvania October 15-18, 1992. Organized by Betsy Erkkila and Jay Grossman, this conference will bring together scholars of American literature speaking on various aspects of Whitman's life, work, and times. The keynote speaker will be Allen Ginsberg; other speakers will include Ionathan Arac, Marcellus Blount, Michael Davidson, Wai Chee Dimock, Betsy Erkkila, Ed Folsom, Allen Grossman, Jay Grossman, Walter Grünzweig, Myra Jehlen, Elizabeth Johns, Katherine Kinney, Sylvia Molloy, Michael Moon, Vivian Pollak, Jorge Salessi, Eve Kosofsky Sedgwick, Alan Trachtenberg, Michael Warner, and Tom Yingling. WHITMAN CELEBRATION IN JAPAN

WHITMAN CENTENARY EXHIBIT IN BOLTON, ENGLAND

Bolton, England, the home of the "Bolton College" group of Whitman admirers (who met regularly from the 1880s through the 1930s to discuss Whitman), celebrated the Whitman Centenary in March, 1992, with an exhibition of materials from the Whitman Collection of the Bolton Public Libraries. Included in the exhibit were the library's copy of the first edition of *Leaves of Grass*, Whitman's "loving cup" presented by the poet to his Bolton friends, and Whitman's stuffed canary bird (given to Dr. J. Johnston of Bolton when Johnston came to visit Whitman in Camden in 1890). The library has issued two commemorative Whitman postcards, one reproducing the frontispiece of the 1855 *Leaves*, the other a color photograph of the canary. The Bolton Libraries and Arts Council, in association with the Bolton branch of the Workers Educational Association, also sponsored a "Walt Whitman day school" with readings and lectures by Keith Sagar, David Wild, and Paul Salveson.

WALKING TOUR OF WHITMAN'S WASHINGTON

Martin Murray of the Washington Friends of Walt Whitman led two walking tours of Whitman's Washington this summer (July 18 and August 1) as part of the Smithsonian Resident Associates Program. The tour highlighted various sites associated with Whitman during his residence (1862-1873) in the capital: the National Portrait Gallery (formerly the Old Patent Office), Center Market, Ford's Theater, Freedom Plaza, the Willard Hotel, the Treasury Building, the White House, and Lafayette Square. The Washington Friends of Whitman have offered this tour annually on Whitman's birthday since 1987; they have also offered a tour called "Walt Whitman and the Battleground of Fredericksburg." On October 3, Murray will lead a tour of Arlington Cemetery sites that had special relevance to Whitman's world.
